Fabulous Fishing...

Spot fishing tops them all! Tremendous numbers of spots have been caught from the ocean piers since Thursday evening, and all other ocean pier fishing is incidental. Spot catches are just as sensational as before Grace passed by. One party took home 600 spots; another had 2 bushels Sunday morning.

Second only to pier fishing is surf

fishing: Bruce McCarthy, Rocky Mount, reported 25 blues, 40 spots, 10 pompano and 10 sea mullet near Salter Path. A Laurinburg party caught 101 flounder on live bait and 87 puppy drum on cut mullet off the Cape Lookout breakwater.

Night fishing in sound and river is good for gray trout, and some blues are being taken. Speckled trout fishing has improved: reports are scattered, but very good catches have been reported over the county. There are innumerable good trout holes in the Newport River above the bridge and in Calico Creek.

Plug fishing as a whole has improved: on the ocean side blues are beginning to take Hopkins lures,

and speckled trout are hitting Hopkins and red-and-yellow seahawks. Inshore and offshore fishing throughout the county was slow during the weekend, for false albacore, kings and blues. Headboat catches of sea bass and other bottom fish were fairly good, and a few red snappers were picked up.

The kings that were landed have been big ones: Johnny Styron, fishing inshore, had 5 totaling 67 pounds; 19-pounders were reported from Sportsman and Morehead piers.

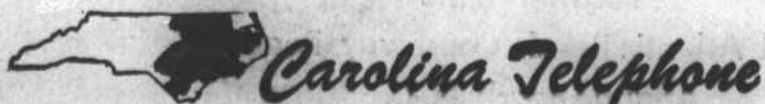
