What is Arthritis?

Arthritis is essentially an inflammation of the surfaces of the joint. This inflammation involves not only the bony surfaces, but the musculature and the ligaments surrounding the joint. In many instances, this joint inflammation results from excessive stresses and strains arising from improper functioning. This is a matter of faulty body mechanism, arising from a bad posture, curvature of the spine, bones out of place, and other conditions which would induce body imbalance.

Another factor that is often involved in arthritis is faulty calcium metabolism. This means the body's ability to utilize for its own purpose the natural calcium salts found in certain foods.

Recent research has demonstrated that there is definite relationship between arthritis and an upset nervous system. Disturbances in the nervous system interfere with metabolism. The chiropractor, in dealing with arthritis, seeks to restore normal body balance, and normal functioning of the nervous system. By removing the pressures which clog, re-establish the body's proper calcium metabolism as well as the correct mechanical functioning of its joints. When he does so, symptoms of arthritis disappear.
