Mr. Congleton left to his wife, Solona Congleton, all real and personal property in his name for the rest of her life.

At the death of his wife the property is to be divided among the five children, Earl Congleton, Mrs. Thelma Pittman, Mrs. Gus Ellison, Mrs. William Dixon, and Mrs. Dorothy Guthrie.

Mrs. Pittman was named executor of the estate.

The Winberry will was made Aug. 8, 1955, probated and filed Dec. 14, 1959. Witnesses were W. J. Hardesty and Alice T. Hardesty. Arbie Winberry was named executor by his father.

To his son, Floyd, Mr. Winberry left a piece of land on the old road between Newport and Harlowe. Floyd is also to put \$250 in the bank for Barry Winberry and it is to remain there until Barry reaches 21 years of age.

To his daughter, Nellie Winberry Garner, was left a \$1,000 bond. To his daughter-in-law, Love Graham Winberry, was left the sum of \$100.

Mr. Winberry directed that he be given a Christian burial, cost not to exceed \$300. The remainder of his money is to be divided between his two sons and daughter.

To the Bay View Baptist Church, Mr. Winberry left \$100 and to his granddaughter, Florence W. Brown, \$100. He directed that all just debts to him be collected and the money divided among his children.

To his friend, Nannie Fodrie, he left \$100. If she be dead at the reading of the will, the money was to go to her daughter, Dorothy Fay Fodrie.

Baptist Hospital to Build 'Hotel' For Patients Not Seriously Sick

Winston-Salem — Baptist Hospital's new minimal care unit, a facility designed to reduce the costs of hospital care to the patient, is scheduled for completion in 1960. The early beginning of the \$600,000 program was made possible when the Baptist State Convention at its recent meeting in Greensboro voted to permit the hospital to borrow the necessary funds and begin work as soon as possible.

A campaign to raise the money will be conducted among friends of the institution. The former student nurses' residence will be converted into the new facility, which will be something of a "hotel" for patients.

Hospital officials explain that patients who are convalescing from surgery or other illnesses and others who are having diagnostic examinations often do not require the

full services of the hospital. They need to be near their doctors, laboratories, and other departments but are able to take care of themselves.

Such patients will be housed in the minimal care unit at a price of approximately \$7 a day instead of the \$17 to \$22 a day which is the cost of a room in the hospital proper. They will get their meals in the cafeteria, which may be

reached without going outdoors, and will walk to doctors' offices and other places in the hospital. Room for 75 patients will be provided in the "Patients' Hotel." This will release 75 beds in the hospital for the acutely ill.

Rooms will be private and each will have its own bath, lounge chairs, rugs on the floor, a television set, air condition, and a sofa bed in case a relative accompanies the patient and wishes housing accommodations. There will be an attractive lobby where they may gather to visit.

In the hospital proper, 2.71 persons are employed for each patient. See HOSPITAL, Page 7, Section 2
