

Willie Stewart To Serve Six Months in Jail

Willie Stewart was sentenced to six months in jail Tuesday in county recorder's court after the court found him guilty of public drunkenness for the third time within a twelve month period. Stewart was charged on two counts of drunkenness but the cases were consolidated.

Dennis M. Hannigan, charged with larceny of less than \$100, appealed his guilty verdict to the next term of superior court. In handing down the conviction, Judge L. R. Morris ordered Hannigan to pay a fine of \$50 and court costs and to reimburse E. E. Williams in the amount of \$50. Bond for Hannigan's appearance in superior court was set at \$500.

Other defendants, their charges and the findings of the court were as follows:

Allan Vane McNair—Failing to stop at a stop sign. Costs paid.

George D. Lynch—Non-support. One year in jail, suspended on payment of court costs and \$10 a week to the clerk of court for the use and benefit of defendant's wife.

Ann R. Boggs—Making an improper turn, resulting in an accident. Judgment suspended on payment of \$10 and costs.

Richard Barrett—Trespassing. Dismissed.

Madie Bell Carter—Neglecting her six minor children. Six months in jail, suspended on five year's good behavior on the part of the defendant. Costs remitted.

Charlie Styron—Violation of fishing laws. Costs paid.

Dale W. Pyles—Failure to comply with a former court order. Three months in jail suspended on payment of costs and fines within 30 days.

William Gaston Simpson—Failing to yield the right of way resulting in an accident. Costs paid.

Agnes Robinson Mann—Failing to yield the right of way. One-half costs paid.

Charles H. Davis—Non-support. One year in jail, suspended on payment of costs and \$20 a week to the welfare department for the support of his minor children.

Taft Pritchard—Public drunkenness. Costs paid.

Wade Locklear—Driving on the wrong side of the road resulting in an accident, 30 days in jail suspended on payment of court costs.

James Thornton Darling—Driving drunk. Found guilty of careless and reckless driving. \$100 and court costs paid.

Delmar E. Tucker—Assault, damaging property and using profane language. Thirty days in jail, suspended on payment of one-half court costs.

Seventy-eight cases were continued until later terms of court.

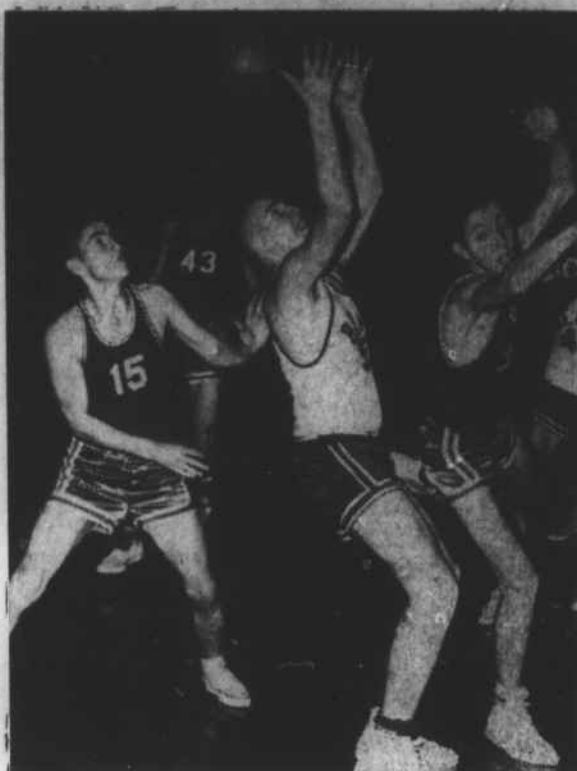
Harbor Diver Recovers Fishing Rod for Youth

Plum Pudding for Christmas—

For centuries, in many families, plum pudding has graced the Christmas dinner table. The pudding may be served from a big cake plate which has been decorated with holly, fruits, or other decorations to suit your taste, or you may have individual servings with whipped cream.

There is an old English superstition which goes like this, "Whoever eats a plum pudding on each of the 12 days between Christmas and Epiphany, making a wish on the first mouthful each day, will be blessed by luck and fulfillment during the next 12 months." May you have luck!

Buy a Half Turkey—Speaking of

turkeys (and who isn't, these days) remember there's a practical way for small families to have holiday turkey dinners. Half turkeys and quarter turkeys can now be purchased, and buying one of these will eliminate leftover problems.

Another advantage of buying just part of a turkey is that cooking time is greatly reduced. For example, half of a 16-pound turkey takes only 3 1/2 hours to cook.

Paper Cups for Salad Molds—Use pointed paper cups as little tree-salad molds. Fill the cups with cranberry, raspberry or lime-flavored gelatin, with fruits or nuts added to your liking, then set in glasses in refrigerator until firm.

Just before serving, cut cup along seam with a razor blade and peel from gelatin. Decorate the "trees" as you please with softened cream cheese or mayonnaise.
