Pruning Trees Adds Strength

Urbana, Ill. (AP)—Pruning is one way to control harmful growth in trees, says W. M. Keith, landscape architect at the University of Illinois. If your trees develop diseased, injured or undesirable growth, pruning will help them to regain strength. To get full beauty from large shade, fruit or flowering trees, prune immediately after planting. In this way most of the undesirable characteristics can be corrected before they get out of hand.

Keith says to remove one-third to one-half of the foliage by cutting off secondary side branches. Then remove the sucker growth from inner portions of branches. You can guard against infection after cutting by painting with asphalt-base tree paint.

Postmaster Mails Many Bees

Mayhew, Miss. (AP)—Business is always buzzing for Mrs. Maude Morris, postmaster of this 225-person hamlet. She handles the mailing of more than 60 million bees a year.

"I like thousands of dollars worth of stamps annually and stick them on literally millions of bees," Mrs. Morris says with pride. Not exactly on the bees—but on the containers carrying them.

Because the huge Stover Apiaries and its bees account for most of the third class postoffice's business, the postoffice department gave Mrs. Morris permission to designate the office "The Bee Post Office, Mayhew, Miss."

The bees are mailed in special hives that have two wire ends for free circulation. A hive will weigh about five pounds and contain about 4,000 bees.
