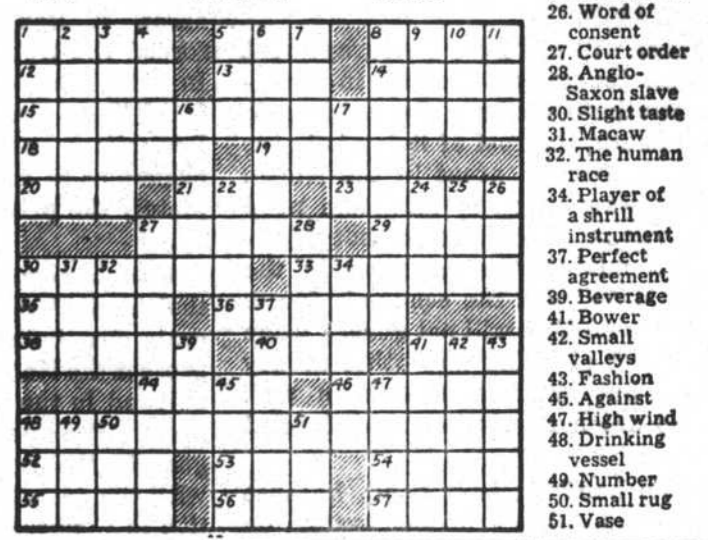
Crossword Puzzle
