- 1 teaspoon baking soda
 - 1 teaspoon salt
 - 1 teaspoon cinnamon
 - 1/2 teaspoon mace
 - 1/4 teaspoon each allspice and cloves
 - 1/2 cup seedless raisins
 - 1/2 cup finely cut citron, orange and lemon peel, combined
- In a good sized bowl, pour the milk over the bread crumbs. Add the shortening, melted, and the molasses. Sift the flour with the soda, salt and spices and stir into the bread crumb mixture with the raisins and other fruit. Pour mixture into small foil pans (the kind used for frozen chicken pies), filling them 2/3 full. Cover each with aluminum foil, crimping it tightly around the rim. Pour boiling water into a large pan to the depth of 3/4".
- Place a rack in the pan and place puddings on it. Cover and steam gently one hour. Remove, cool, make sure wrappings are tight, and freeze. For gift giving, over-

Law Change May Change Status

Anyone who has been told in the past that he did not have enough work under social security to qualify for payments should get in touch with his social security office now to see if he is eligible under the change in the law. This suggestion is from James O. Gabbard, field representative of the social security district office in New Bern.

The amount of work required to get social security benefits has been reduced. Just how long you must work depends upon your date of birth (or if you die or become disabled, upon the date of your death or disability). Because of this recent change, the survivors

of workers who died after June 1954 and who were not eligible for benefits under the old law may now be eligible.

In many cases the amount of work required under the old law has been reduced about a third. For example, a man becoming 65 or a woman becoming 62 in the first six months of 1960 needed 4 1/2 years of work or 18 quarters of coverage under the old law to be eligible for a monthly benefit. Under the new law, 3 years or 12 quarters of coverage are required.

Individuals who are planning to file for retirement benefits should bring proof of their age. An old, written record is desirable, the older the better. They should also bring a record of their latest earnings, a wage statement (W-2) from an employer or a copy of last year's tax return if self-employed.

This may be needed in determining whether or not the work requirements are met or in determining the amount of the benefits.

It is recommended that you contact your nearest social security office if you think you may be eligible for benefits.

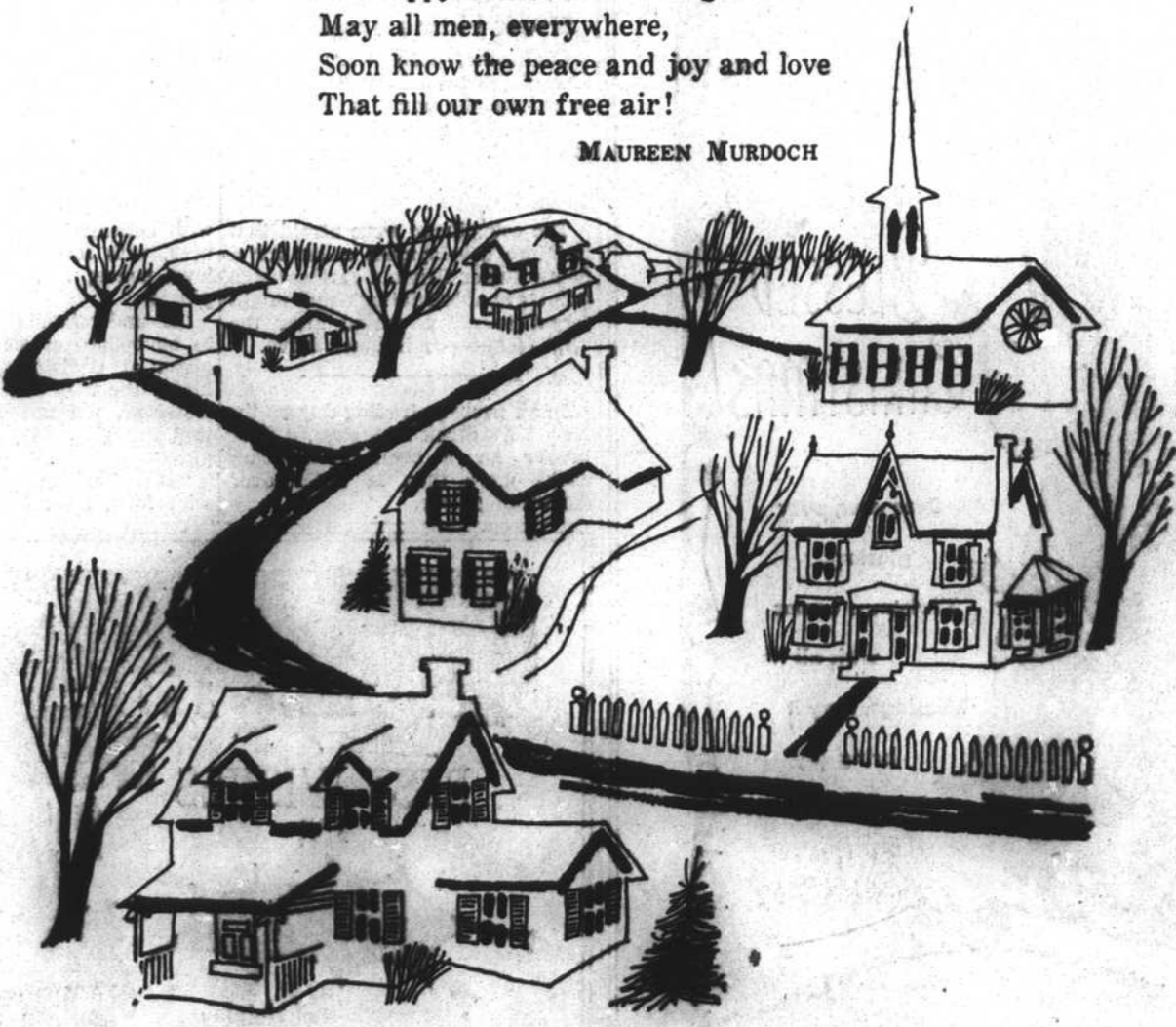
