During the evening the guests enjoyed several games. Refreshments following the Christmas theme were served.

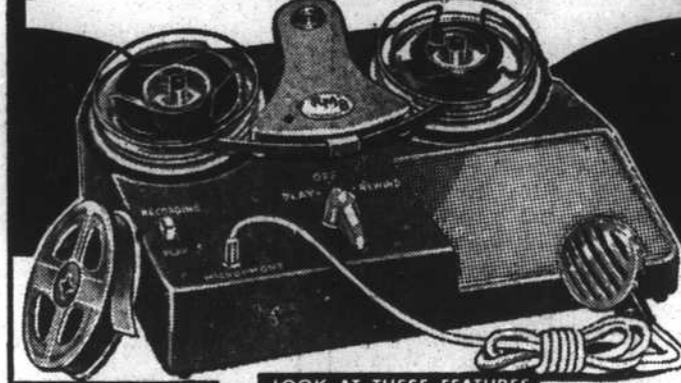
