The state's highest court will hear arguments in the case Tues-Charles Stevens, Beaufort, one of

the attorneys for Chadwick and Mrs. Willis, said yesterday the case is merely to test the validity of the two laws passed by the state in recent years to get animals off the fast-eroding outer banks.

Chadwick and Mrs. Willis have defied the law by keeping a herd of about 30 cattle on Shackleford. Half of the herd was reported to have been taken off in the past

few weeks by its owners. Prior to that time, they got a restraining order which prevented drastic means to get rid of the cat-

straining order. The cattle owners claim the law deprives them of property without due process of law and without proper compensation.
