New Hearing Date on Bridge Expected

plans to conduct another hearing on location of the bridge across Newport river at Morehead City.

Reliable sources said yesterday that the State Highway commission would make announcement of the hearing in the near future. The decision on a hearing was made after Army Engineers in Washington, D. C., said that unless there were intervention from the governor's office in Raleigh by this past weekend, the highway commission's plans for the bridge could be considered approved.

Gov. Terry Sanford did not intervene, choosing instead to start at 2 p.m. and an adult concert at from scratch with another hearing. At present, the highway commisnorth of the present railroad bridge.

The Men's Club of St. James Methodist church, Newport, will observe its seventh anniversary reunion at the meeting Thursday night at 6:30.


