Of all crops harvested, 26 percent were soybeans; corn constituted 19 percent, hay crops 18 percent, vegetables for sale 14 percent, tobacco 9 percent, small grains 8 percent and other crops 6 percent.

Farmland in the county totals 89,887 acres of which 12 percent in 1960 was in harvested cropland, 8 percent in pasture, 2 percent in the number of brood sows (462)

Dercent was in woodlands and was 327 as cent was 327 as compared with 170 in 1959.

Soybean acreage was 3,662; corn acreage 2,637 and tobacco acreage ushels to 10,257 bushels.

Living on farm tracts were 2,540 days or more on off-farm jobs during 1960.

The figures for the farm survey were contributed by farmers of the county when they listed taxes in January. Figures were released by 3,800. Metal grain storage capacity in increased, going from 9,192 bushels to 10,257 bushels.



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
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
