Plans to sink a well on Harkers Island have reportedly been abandoned because equipment cannot be gotten to the site.

In April 1945 a well was sunk by the Coastal Plains Co. on the John Laughton farm, Crab Point, but the well yielded nothing. At that time it was reported that the firm had 10,000 acres of Crab Point land under lease and that 200 oil leases were on file in the register of deeds office, Beaufort.




