# **Drilling Begins on Third Site** In Current Exploration for Oil

### **Rig Moves to Straits;** Atlantic Well Capped

Drilling on the third site, in the current search for oil

The drilling, on the George Huntley-Ernest Davis property at Straits, follows completion of a well at Atlantic where it is reported that the best indications of oil-bearing sands to date had been found. But no oil.

> +Plains Oil Co., which is putting down the test wells, said, "We found quite a few potentially good sands at Atlantic, but 'no shows'."

The Atlantic drilling went below 5,000 feet, the deepest any well has yet been driven in this county. The first of the three wells was put down at Merrimon, to a depth of 4,100. The Atlantic and Merrimon wells have been capped.

The oil drilling equipment was moved last week to the Straits site.

President S. A. Chalk said \$800 had been collected since the Oct. 2 meeting, and added if those attending the Oct. 2 meeting had worked as hard at collecting as he had "we haven't had near the response we should have.'

"I believe the best thing for us to do, in all fairness to Norwood Young," President Chalk added, "is to let him know we can't continue on with his services." Mr. Young was given notice at the Oct. 2 meeting that his salary would
