Jonquil Aids In Salvage Job

The Jonquil, Coast Guard buoy ender from Fort Macon, is helping salvage the cargo of the Conlerate blockade runner recently located near Wilmington.

Navy and civilian divers have been working to retrieve the munitions aboard the sunken vessel. A number of artillery shells, muskets and other military equipment have been taken from the hulk.

The Jonquil, which left Fort Ma-con Tuesday, was in the area doing work on navigational aids and was diverted to help in the salvage

Divers stated that the recent storm along the coast had cleared the wreck so that salvage was feasible, but unless cargo is brought up quickly, currents now building up will make diving imposible.
