State College **Professor** To Give Lecture

Dr. Reinard Harkema, professor of zoology at North Carolina State college, will deliver the fifth Arthur Sperry Pearse Memorial lecture Wednesday night at the Duke University Marine laboratory

The lecture is given annually in memory of the late Dr. Pearse under whose stimulation, leadership guidance the Duke Marine laboratory got its start in 1938. Dr. Pearse was the first director of the station.
