C., up to and including March 19, 1917, for the merchantable dead chestnut timber, standing or down and all the live chestnut timber marked or otherwise designated for cutting on an area of about 600 acres, on the watershed of Pritchard's Creek, about 3 miles north of Graphiteville, Mount Mitchell National Forest, North Carolina, estimated to be 1200 cords of chestnut acid-wood, more or less. No bids less than \$0.50 per cord will be considered. The right to reject any and all bids reserved. Before bids are submitted, full information concerning timber and conditions of sale and the submission of bids should be obtained from the Forest Examiner in Charge, Marion, North Carolina.
