Yancey County Farmers.

We have presented to us in the immediate future our greatest opportunity for increasing our acreage of food and feed crops. Yancey county has this year approximately 6,000 acres in wheat, oats and other small grain. All of this land will be available for a second food or feed crop. In years past, according to the best information I am able to obtain, something like 75 per cent of this land has remained in stubble until the following fall or spring. The same percentage would give us this year about 4500 acres of tillable land, most of it in fine shape to be put into another crop lying idle in a time of stress and in a time of opportunity.

The harvesting season for small grains is almost here. Land that can be put in shape as soon as the small grain is off can very easily grow such crops as soy beans, cowpeas, cabbage and potatoes. Buckwheat is an excellent catch crop and should be planted generally. Sorghum, millet and sudan grass are fine crops for forage. The acreage in late cabbage should be greatly increased for there will be a good demand for them this coming fall.

All kinds of seed are high but to offset this the products are sure to be high also. And therefore if the farmers will be judicious in the use of seed he can stretch them out a little further than he has been accustomed to doing, they were broadcasted. By mixing with sorghum, half-bushel of soybeans or the mixture will be most ample for an acre, and planted in rows thus cultivated once or twice will yield approximately as much as they were broadcasted. By sowing soybeans, cowpeas and sorghum we suggest the seed per acre will cost little if any more than we have been paying in years past.

With all of these excellent crops available for late planting we have a wonderful opportunity before us. You are urged by the North Carolina State Department of Agriculture and the North Carolina Food Conservation Commission to increase the acreage and production of food and feed crops to the very greatest extent possible.

Now, gentlemen here is our opportunity and our duty. The time is now! A few weeks from now it will be too late--the opportunity for service and profit will have passed.
