### Yancey County Man Figures in Serious Car Wreck

One man was killed and others injured, none seriously, early Monday night, when W. R. Johnson, 38, of Weaverville, was instantly killed on the Weaverville highway, near Lake Louise, when the car he was driving collided head-on with a truck. Raley Elliott, son of Lat Elliott, who lives in Yancey county, was the driver of the truck that collided with the car driven by Johnson. He received cuts and bruises.

Mr. Johnson, a resident engineer in the construction department of the State highway and public works commission, was driving a car owned by the commission. It was demolished. The car was driving North and the truck was going toward Asheville. The accident happened on a curve, and officers who investigated said that the tire tracks of the highway department automobile indicated clearly that it was being driven on the wrong side of the highway when the crash occurred.

Mr. Johnson was alone in the car, while Homer Elliott, brother of the truck driver, was in the truck. Raley Elliott was placed under bond pending a coroner's inquest.

### The New License Plates

Upwards of 450,000 motor vehicles will spread the name of North Carolina in bigger type next year, as the 1935 license plates will be an half-inch wider with the extra space going into the name of the Tar Heel State. The name, incidentally, will be switched from the bottom to the top of the tag, which will have a black background and apple green lettering.

The plant at Central Prison, Raleigh, is being prepared to put out nearly 500,000 sets of plates. Each pair of plates will cost the State about six and one-half cents, including labor and distribution. They will cost the purchaser roughly from \$9 to \$30, depending on the weight of the vehicle.
