THE BANK SWALLOW

The Bank Swallow, the smallest of the Swallow family, is widely distributed both in Europe and America. It ranges over most of Eastern America and is common in Western North Carolina.

It is five or five and a half inches long; the upper parts are brownish gray; the lower parts are white with the exception of a brownish gray band across the breast; the throat is white; there is a small tuft of feathers above the hind toe.

This Swallow usually excavates horizontally a hole in a bank to a depth of two or three feet in which it builds its nest. It lays from four to six pure white eggs. Sometimes as many as a hundred or more nests are close together. Its food is composed altogether of insects, which it with wide-spread mouth catches on the wing. Its song is a mere twitter.

The Bank Swallow is an interesting and a very useful bird.
