NEW AAA FARM PROGRAM FOLLOWS DEFENSE IDEA

With national defense the paramount issue in the country today, the 1941 AAA farm program has been designed to tie in closely with defense aims, says E. Y. Floyd, AAA executive officer of State College.

The new program, which has just been announced, will emphasize conservation of the soil and the maintenance of abundant supplies through an ever-normal granary plan.

Based on recommendations of farmer-committeemen who met in Washington earlier in the summer, the 1941 program will follow the same general lines of the 1939 and 1940 programs.

Small farmers' needs have been given further consideration in the new program, Floyd said. For instance, the provision under which at least \$20 may be earned on any farm through conservation measures will be continued in 1941. If as much as \$15 is earned by planting forest trees, any farm may receive as much as \$35 under the program.

The program also provides that on small farms where the maximum payment is not more than \$20, any part of the soil-building allowance may be earned by carrying out locally adapted conservation practices not included in the National program.

This provision will be applicable in designated areas where needed, and the practices for which payment will be made in this special group will be recommended by local committeemen.

Likewise, Floyd said, in areas where feed crops are not generally produced for market, any farmer may grow as much as 30 acres of soil-depleting crops without incurring a deduction for exceeding the total soil-depleting acreage allotment.

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NINE BEAR HUNTS SCHEDULED

The hunts will be permitted on the areas for two-day periods between November 4 and November 23 as follows:

Daniel Boone Area: Nov. 4 and 5th; 11 and 12th; 18 and 19th.

Mt. Mitchell Area: Nov. 6 and 7th; 13 and 14th; 20 and 21st.

Sherwood Forest: Nov. 8 and 9th; 15 and 16th; 22 and 23rd.

A total of 9 successful applicants and 6 alternates will be determined through 3 public and impartial drawings, one drawing for each area, held at 307 City Hall, Asheville, N. C. on October 21 at 10 a. m.

Applications shall be accepted in the form of a letter addressed to C. N. Mease, Refuge Supervisor, City Hall, Asheville, N. C.

All applications must be in the Asheville office on or before October 21, at 9 a. m. After such time no applications will be recognized. Applications must be made from persons possessing recognized bear dogs or in position to obtain such dogs.

Such applications must be accompanied by a cashier's check of \$5.00, made payable to C. N. Mease, Refuge Supervisor, which will be returned if the applicant is not chosen in the public drawing. In addition, five days after notification of successful selection, such applicants shall deposit an additional remittance of \$20.00, making the total fee \$25.00. This fee shall also be made payable to the Refuge Supervisor.

Upon checking into the hunting areas, a fee of 50 cents per dog shall be paid by the successful applicant. Successful applicants may invite not more than 24 persons to accompany him on the hunt and shall not carry more than 10 dogs. All persons must have a North Carolina hunting license.

The limit on bear will be one bear per person. No other wildlife shall be disturbed or molested in any manner.

Hunting will be permitted between sunrise and sunset of each day.

Hunters will be permitted to camp on the areas to be hunted the night before each hunt.

If weather prevents hunting on the scheduled date, another period may be substituted during any period between November 4 and 23.

The hunt shall be conducted within the limit of the State laws, National Forest rules and regulations, and the provisions of the Wildlife Cooperative Agreement.
