SAFETY

The old adage to the effect that there is stfety in numbers certainly does not apply in automobile travel, according to Ronald Hocutt, director of the North Carolina Highway Safety Division.

"Happiness is the keynote when a group of young people pile into an automobile and start off to the fair or a football game, or on some other short trip, but if they overcrowd the car, grief may soon enter the picture," said the safety director.

Hocutt pointed to the recent accident in which an automobile loaded with eight young people overturned while enroute to a high school football game, injuring four of the boys and girls in the car and killing two.

"There is serious danger in the practice of overloading an automobile," he declared. "In the first place, when three or four people are jammed into the front seat, the driver does not have sufficient room to operate the car safely, due to the difficulty of shifting gears and using the brakes. And on top of that, when there are too many people in a car, the driver has too many distractions and can not very well keep his or her mind on their driving."

Hocutt cautioned all car owners against overloading the automobiles, and he particularly urged that parents who allow their teen-age children the family car to go to a football game, dance or other school activity should admonish their children not to take along any greater number of persons than the car was designed to accommodate.
