LOCAL CHAPTER OF INFANTILE PARALYSIS FOUNDATION IS ORGANIZED

A meeting was called and held by Mr. C. H. Harris of Asheville, in the Yancey County Community Club building, Tuesday, August 26, 1941 for the purpose of organizing a local chapter of the National Foundation for Infantile Paralysis.

Mr. Harris led the discussion and explained the purpose of having an executive committee for the local chapter. This committee was selected by Mr. Harris before he called a meeting. Members of the committee are as follows:

Dr. C. M. Whisnant, Dentist; Dr. J. J. Croley, District Health Officer; Dr. C. M. Cheadle, Private practitioner; Mrs. Elizabeth H. Crouse, County Health Nurse; Miss Hope Buck, County Supt. of Education; Mrs. C. R. Hamrick, Editor of the Yancey Record; Charles L. Brown, Chairman of County Commissioners; R. N. Scott, Cashier of North Western Bank; W. B. Wray, Manager Nu-Wray Hotel; Lee Hilliard, Feldspar Milling Company.

Mr. Harris explained that the Executive Committee could take in other members if necessary, but advised that better work would be accomplished with a small group. He stated the purpose of the chapter shall be to act locally for the National Foundation for Infantile Paralysis. He also explained the function of the chapter is to render direct assistance to those afflicted with infantile paralysis, to furnish funds for braces, crutches, wheelchairs, casts, hospitalization, transportation, and the like to the fullest extent possible within it's means.

The Social Security Act passed in Aug. 14, 1935 and amended Aug. 16, 1939 was described by Mr. Harris as federal aid to states for service to crippled children. This phase of the Social Security gives a dollar for every dollar the local chapter has. He also brought out the fact that in case of epidemics the local chapter would wire National Headquarters, 120 Broadway, New York City, and receive aid such as nurses, doctors, equipment money, braces, etc.

Publicity was discussed as a means of detaining a successful Infantile Paralysis program. The celebration of President Roosevelt's birthday and the "March of Dimes" should be the occasion for intensive publicity.

Following these explanations and discussions, the officers of the executive committee for the local chapter of the National Foundation were elected and are as follows:

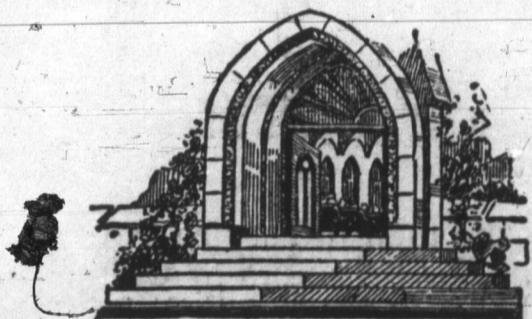
