PLANS BEING MADE FOR FURNISHING AAA LIME

Plans now are being made by County AAA committees for furnishing ground limestone to North Carolina farmers as a grant-of-aid material under the 1943 AAA program, according to G. T. Scott, chairman of the State AAA committee, with headquarters at N. C. State College. Orders for limestone under the 1942 program already have exceeded 300,000 tons, and orders will be accepted under this program until September 15, Scott said.

Present indications are that slightly more than 250,000 acres of oats will be seeded in North Carolina this fall, an increase of 5 percent over the 1941 ac-

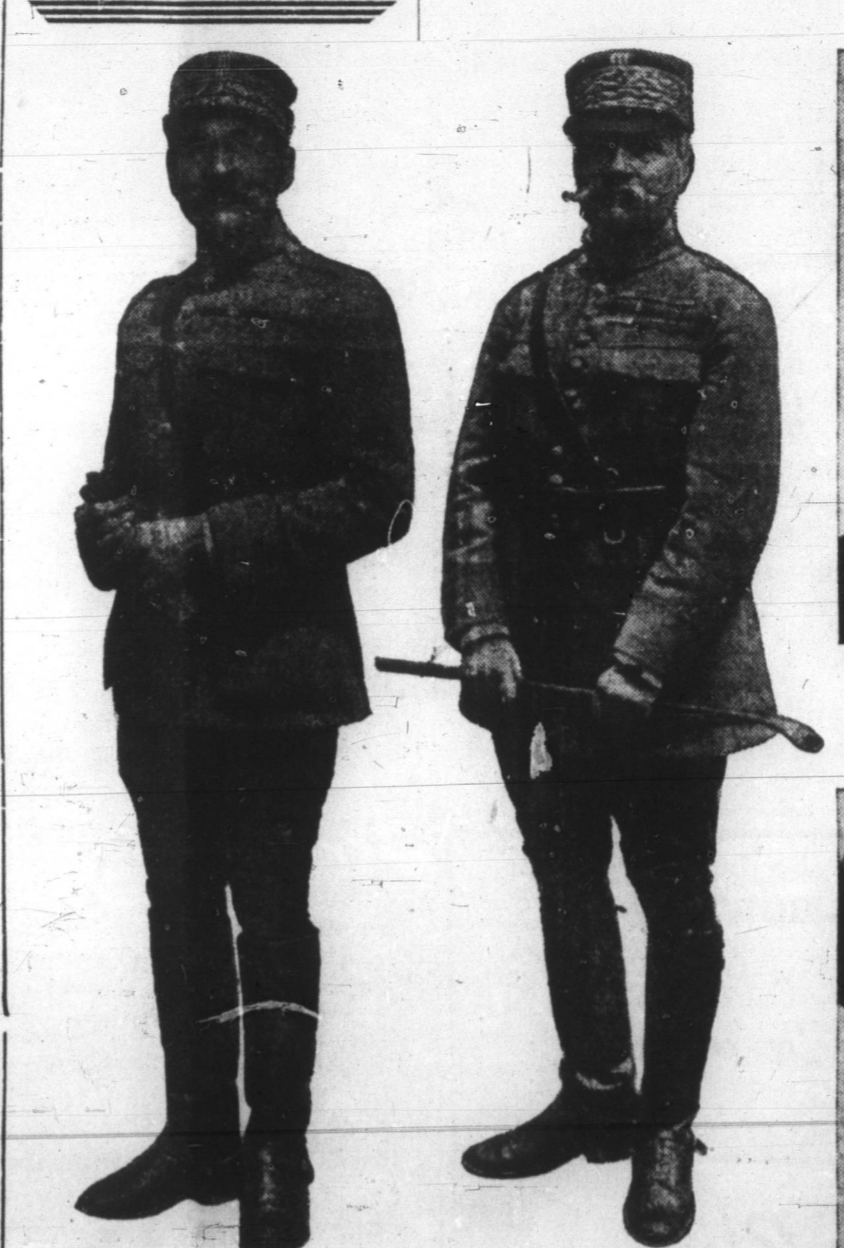
Great Americans on Screen in "Sergeant York" Movie



Though Gary Cooper doesn't resemble York externally, there is a great deal of similarity between the two. It was at York's suggestion that Cooper was engaged for the role. Both are quiet, modest and unassuming.

This is York in a photograph taken soon after his single-handed feat of daring that won the plaudits of the world. The Sergeant said he didn't mind his screen counterpart not wearing a mustache.

Alvin York, the simple, unaffected farm boy from Tennessee's Three Forks of the Wolf, never expected that he would ever get to know many great Americans. As a matter of fact, before he left home and became the greatest individual hero of the World War, he probably was not aware of the existence of many great Americans. Excepting, of course, Washington, Lincoln, and the rugged Daniel Boone, who was "a local boy," and whose feats of pioneering were word-of-mouth legends in the Cumberland hills. But, as can be seen in the Warner Bros. movie, "Sergeant York," Alvin got to meet some pretty important people. Kings, queens, statesmen and so forth. In making the film, Warners tried to reproduce a faithful likeness of the characters delineated. See the accompanying photos for the result.
