F. S. A. NEWS LIVING AT HOME ON THE FARM

Last spring our Secretary of Agriculture emphasized strongly the need of families to live at home this year, which could be best carried out by planting more and better plantings. Cooperation with neighbors in use of labor

and machinery, improvements on farms which would in turn help families to preserve food and feed produced.

With the FSA families of Yancey County supervisors have tried to work as closely as possible in helping to produce more food and feed than ever. In traveling over the county much good result is being seen as crops are being harvested. An example bearing this out came from Mr. and Mrs. Hicks Fox on Jacks Creek, last week saying that they had improved their place by moving their house so it would be possible to build a basement under the house, building a spring box to properly care for their milk and grubbing several acres of land in order to be able to increase cropping acreage. Mr. and Mrs. Fox built their basement with a few days labor and lum-

ber on hand. It is well built and will help in keeping canned and stored food. Last year Mrs. Lox canned 350 quarts of fruits and vegetables for a family of 6 and to date this year she has filled approximately 600 quarts. Mrs. Fox says with food gathered in so far they are far better off than they were last year.


Another improvement they plan to undertake next spring is to sell off all of their mixed chickens and buy some pure bred baby chicks of dual type in order to produce more eggs so as to have plenty for home use and for market.

This is one of the many families trying to do their part in the war effort which deserves recognition.
