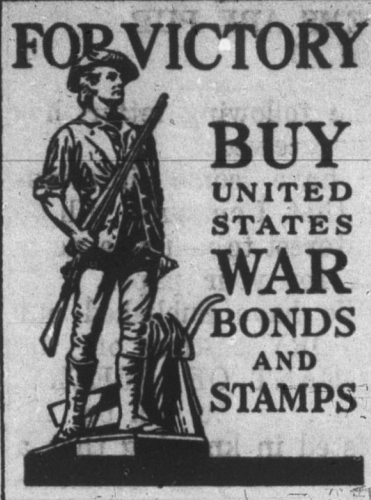

"So They Say"

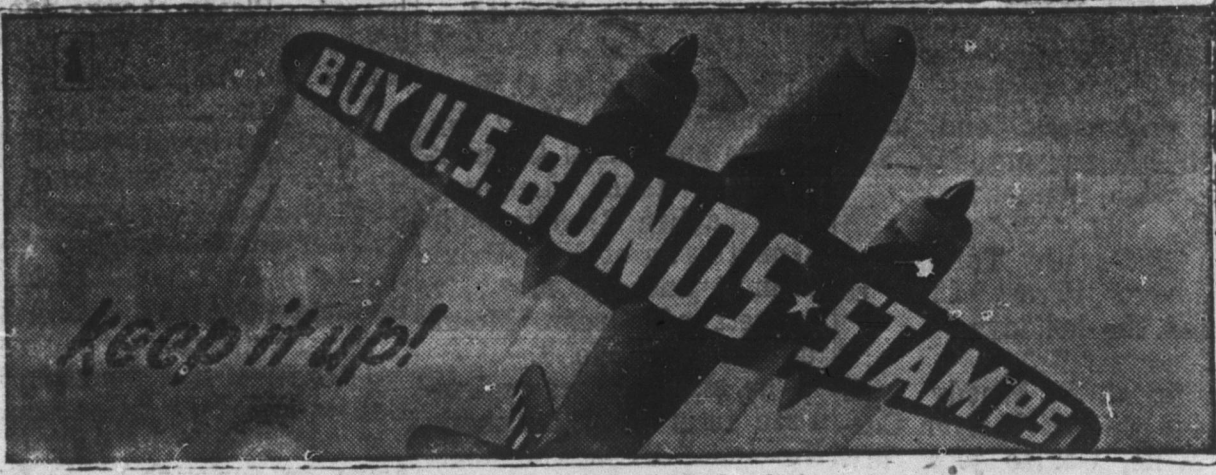
