The faculty and students of Micaville high school assembled on the campus and stood anxiously awaiting the arrival of Capt. Hilliard.

At last the word went around "There he comes." A cheer went up from the waiting crowd, as he zoomed over the campus, then upward to soar gracefully over the campus again. He went into a wide circle and leveling out on his course dipped his wings in a farewell salute and headed out into the blue as every one watched.

An added thrill was that Capt. Hilliard was flying one of the Army's fastest fighter planes, a P-47 Thunderbolt.

Capt. Hilliard is a graduate of Micaville high school and has always been proud of his Alma Mater.

Some time ago, as a token of esteem and respect, the citizens and students of Micaville presented Capt. Hilliard with a beautiful wrist watch.

Captain Hilliard is a veteran of the Southwest Pacific area. He has 146 Combat missions to his credit as a pursuit pilot. He holds the Distinguished Flying Cross, the air medal with oak leaf clusters and the citation ribbon.

He is the son of Mr. and Mrs. L. M. Hilliard of Micaville.
