STATE CHICK PRODUCTION DOWN 40 PER CENT

Raleigh.—North Carolina hatcheries reduced the output of chicks 40 per cent in May as compared with a year ago, the State Department of Agriculture reports. Department officials attributed the sharp decline to diminished feed supplies and the decreased demand for chicks.

Hatcheries produced 3,300,000 chicks during May, over 2,000,000 less than May 1943. The output of hatchery chicks from January 1 through May was 22,563,000 against 26,887,000 for the same period last year—a decline of 16 per cent.

Mr. and Mrs. Roy Proffitt and daughters are here from Charlotte to visit relatives.

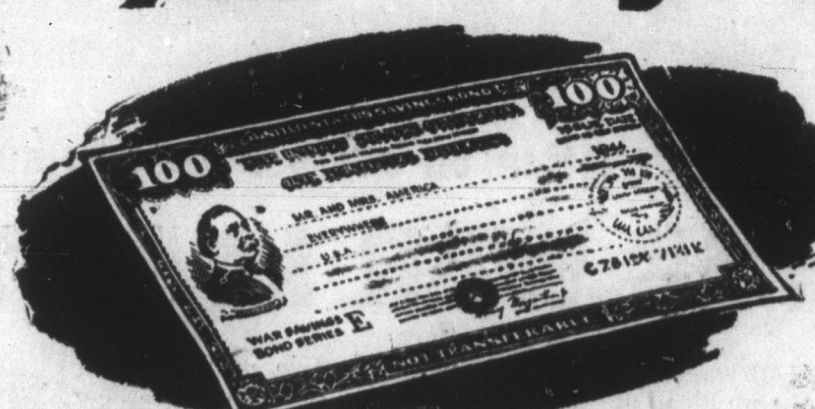
