

On a recent trip over the state he noted many fields in all sections, from the Coastal Plain to the Moun- tains, where the leaves of the alfalfa crop were yel- lowing, showing a clear in- dication that the crop was suffering for boron. These plants develop branches that are much too close to- gether and the leaves near the growing point are yel- low, sometimes slightly red- dened. This is the best time of the year to determine the need of alfalfa for boron, and Collins suggests that growers examine the ir fields closely.
