The office of the Yancey county war price and rationing board will be closed on the first week-day of each month, beginning Thursday, February 1, the measure is being taken to allow the board workers time to make monthly reports.

SOCIAL SECURITY BOARD ADVISES EMPLOYEES OVER AGE 65 TO INQUIRE

Due to the fact that mica production has been reduced in this area, with mines and mica houses closing the first of the year, D. W. Lambert, Manager of the Social Security Board Field Office in Asheville, suggests that all men and women who are now over 65 years old, and have not previously inquired about possible benefits, do so at once if they have been employed in jobs covered by the social Security Act since December 31, 1936.

Mr. Lambert explained that it is very important for the wage earner to inquire after age 65, if no longer employed or having a decrease in average monthly wage after reaching age 65, because he can file claim and "freeze" his wage record at the higher level, thus obtaining higher benefits when the worker retires completely.

Only workers over 65 are involved in this situation, Mr. Lambert said, but any person who desires information is invited to write the field office at 203 Flatiron Building in Asheville.

The house where he entertained Andrew Jackson and Martin Van Buren during the campaign of 1844, when he was elected, is also of two stories and was erected in 1820. 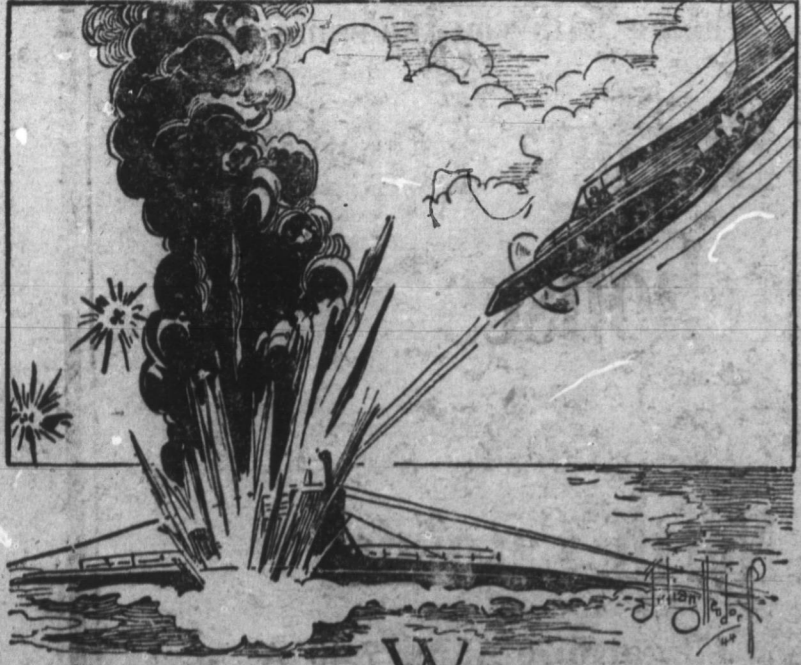
