

had served on the board of 1. TYPHOID VACCINATION: At present this is the best method of controlling Typhoid Fever which always is serious in unvaccinated people. If you had typhoid vaccine LAST year, then one dose this year year and each succeeding year is sufficient. If you did not have it last year, then BE CERTAIN to come the FIRST DAY. If your children want the Schick or Tuberculin test, be sure to come the 1st or 2nd date, since the test MUST BE READ at the

> DIPHTHERIA VACCINATION: The N. C. law requires that all children between the ages of six months and five years be vaccinated against Diphtheria. PENALTY for violation is fixed at a FINE OF \$50 or 30 DAYS IN JAIL. If you cannot pay your private physician to do this, bring them to these clinics and we will do it free of charge.

> SMALLPOX VACCINATION: This is required of every child before he enters school next year. Please be sure that your child has a scar and if not please bring him to the clinic.

SCHICK TEST: This is a small skin test for susceptibility to Diphtheria. It is the only way we can be certain that your vaccinated child is protected from Diphtheria. If your child has been vaccinated as long ago as three months, we will be glad to do this test and give you the result.

TUBERCULIN TEST: If you have been exposed to a case of Tuberculosis, you may have contracted this disease. It may not show up clinically, but a tuberculin test will give us good evidence of the disease very early, that is, in the early incipient stage.

BLOOD TEST: If you think you have been exposed to Syphilis, or if you want a health certificate we will be glad to do this test free. The N. C. law requires every woman to have a Blood test as soon as she knows she is to become a mother. PENALTY for violation is a \$25 FINE or 30 DAYS IN JAIL. Expectant mothers who have not had this test are EXPECTED at these clinics.

WHOOPING COUGH VACCINATION: The N. C. law requires that every child be vaccinated against whooping cough during the 1st year of life. Penalty for violation is \$50 or 30 days in jail. If you cannot pay your physician for this vaccination we will give it free. This vaccination is very effective in preventing whooping cough. In cases where it fails to entirely prevent the disease it certainly makes the attack lighter. We give it to children from around 4 months of age up. Four doses at weekly intervals

We will do all of this work each Saturday morning throughout the year, at the Burnsville Office and each Monday morning at the Newland Offoce; Saturday mornings at Bakersville office and every day 9 to 4:30 at Spruce Pine Office, except on Saturday. We close all our offices at noon on Saturday.
