### Spuds Sprout Wings



Out of the earth and into the sky will go millions of bushels of potatoes in 1945! The mainstay of the American dinner table has grown wings for victory.

Starch from the U. S. family's favorite vegetable has taken on the important job of "lashing" or coating certain yarns used in manufacturing airplane fabric, parachute cloth and closely-woven balloon cloth. It's in other needed textiles, too.

About 400 million bushels of potatoes will be needed in 1945 for all uses, the production (with average yields) from a national goal of 3,137,000 acres. Total plantings sought this year are four percent greater than the 1944 acreage. Last year's planting of 3,009,700 acres produced 379,436,000 bushels of potatoes.

Emphasis is being placed on late potatoes, since the early crop must be used while fresh and cannot be stored to supply markets next winter and in the early spring of 1946.

The price support program for potatoes produced this year will be at a level not less than 90 percent of the parity price as of January 1, 1945, for early and intermediate varieties, and as of July 1, 1945, for late potatoes.
