

BILL TAYLOR DROWN-ED NEAR CELO

Andy C. "Bill" Taylor was drowned about 3:00 o'clock Thursday afternoon while swimming in the South Toe River near Celo. He had been swimming for some time when he suffered either cramps or a heart attack and went under after calling for help. His body was recovered within an hour but attempts to revive him were unsuccess-

Mr. Taylor received a discharge on Saturday, August 4 after 13 months in service. He was overseas for 8 months, and had seen service in France, Belgium and Germany. He was wounded in Belgium in January and spent some time in a hospital in Paris, and was sent back to the states about two months

Funeral services were held at the Windom Free Will Baptist church on Saturday morning at 10 o'clock with the Rev. Cecil Higgins and the Rev. H. M. Alley officiating. Holcombe and Edwards were in charge of arrangements and burial was in the Honeycutt family cemetery.

Surviving are the widow, the former Miss Nell Brinkley of Windom; a three month old daughter; the father, Richard E. Taylor of Burnsville; the step mother; two sisters, Mrs. James Brinkley of Windom and Mrs. Wilburn Honeycutt of Burnsville; five half brothers and one half sister; two grand fathers, J. C. Taylor of Swiss and Andrew Johnson of Swiss.
