LATE TOMATO BLIGHT CONTROLLED IN TESTS

The worst epidemic of late blight in tomatoes in years swept across the mountain areas this summer and virtually all tomato plants were destroyed except where growers used fungicidal dusts or sprays to control the disease.

Howard R. Garriss, Extension plant pathologist at State College, arranged through county agents for a series of demonstrations. After the tests were concluded, he made the following statement: "Fermate, a new fungicide, gave fair to good control of tomato diseases, where it was applied regularly and properly, but 'fixed' coppers such as yellow cuprous oxide and tribasic copper sulphate remain as the best fungicides for tomatoes in North Carolina thus far.

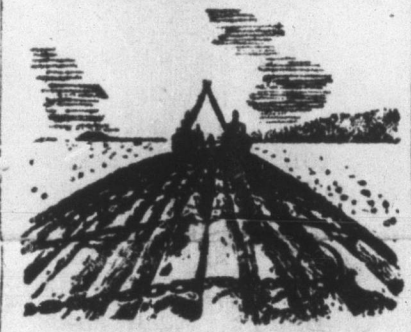
"Yellow cuprocide spray has given excellent results in Ashe and other mountain counties. This material has been scarce in wartime but should be more plentiful next year. Yellow cuprocide is equally effective, when used properly."

Some farmers applied the dusts to their tomatoes through a closely woven sack but this was unsatisfactory for disease control. Garriss said that a rotary type hand duster or a good puff type duster is essential in doing a good job of applying a uniform coating of dust for disease control.

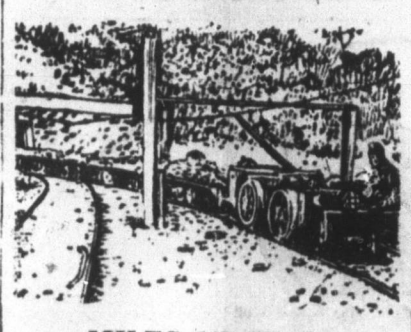

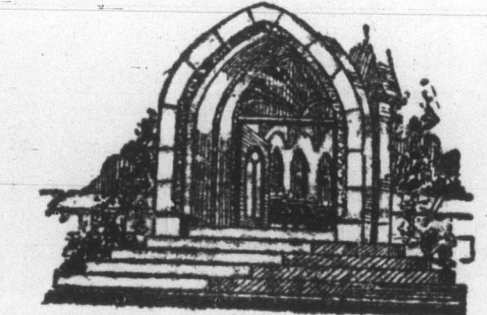

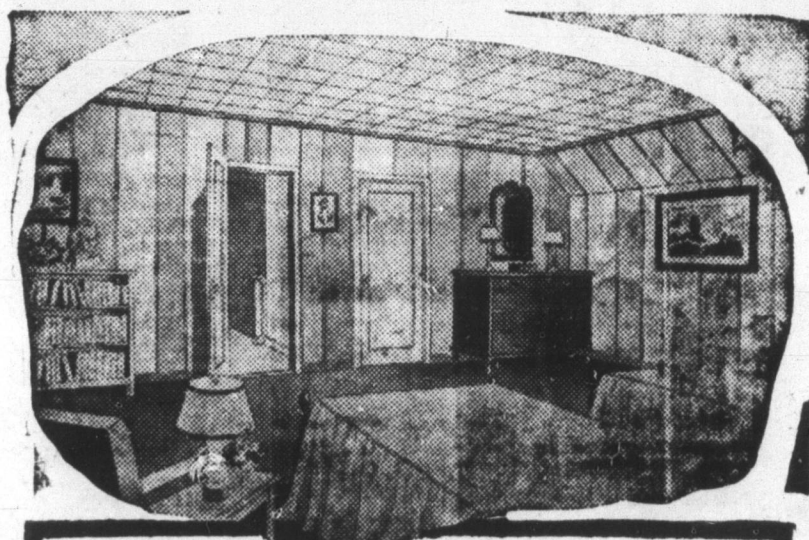
