Wheat grown in a rotation of wheat, sweet clover, and corn on a Davidson clay loam soil, which had been lihtly fertilized, responded to phosphoric acid and potash.

Since much of the small grain acreage is lightly fertilized, the station report! reminds farmers that they should be careful in planning their fertilizer requrements for small grains. Under these conditions small grains respond to both a complete fertilizer at seeding and a topdressing of nitrogen in early spring.
