SCHOOL LUNCHES

More than \$1,763,000 in assistance had been provided by the U. S. Department of Agriculture for the school year through February to help provide nutritious and well-balance mid-day lunches for North Carolina school children, it has been disclosed.

Approximately 224,204 children, in 923 schools, availed themselves of hot lunches in January, records indicating a total of 3,796,394 individual lunches were served. Though many schools otherwise eligible are not availing themselves of school lunch program assistance, he said the program is now in successful operation in 99 of the state's 100 counties.

The school lunch program sponsored at the state level by the U. S. Department of Agriculture under an agreement with the State Department of Education, is operated locally by non-profit sponsoring groups. Each lunchroom is a community project, and sponsoring groups are reimbursed up to designated amounts for each meal served.
