CANNING WITH OR WITHOUT SUGAR
 Scarcity of sugar means changes in some canning habits. It should not mean that less food is canned but only that changes be made in the way it is canned. If you have no sugar, can anyway, then the sugar may be added from your ration next winter. The sugar shortage will give everyone an opportunity to experiment with less sugar and try sugar substitutes when they are available.
When Canning With Sugar
 1. If you have sugar to use, use less of it than in previous years. That is, a light syrup in place of the medium syrup you might have used.
 Strawberries are good with one-half cup of sugar per quart of berries. Some fruits are sweet and require less sugar than this.
 a. If you have honey of your own, use it.
 b. Honey adds a flavor of its own and may be used with good results for up to one-half the sugar.
 c. A few grains of salt removes some of the tartness from fruits and brings out the fruit flavor. Not more than one-eighth to one-fourth teaspoon per quart should be used.
When Canning Without Sugar
 Fruits will keep when canned without sugar.

1. Fruits are best canned in their own juice. Sort the fruit or berries into three groups—the fully ripe, the ripe but firm, and the imperfect fruit. Discard the fully ripe fruit in a double boiler or in an ordinary pan set in hot water, just long enough to draw out the juice. Strain. Use this fruit juice instead of water for the liquid in canning. A small amount of water may need to be added to dry fruits such as apples when preparing the juice.
 2. If a little sugar is available, a small amount of sugar syrup may be put in the bottom of each jar and the remaining space filled with unsweetened fruit juice.
SACCHARINE - Saccharine should not be canned with fruits. When it is canned and processed with the fruits it produces a bitter flavor. If it is used at all, it should be added in very small amounts just before serving. The use of heat in preparing fruits with saccharine for serving makes it bitter as in canning. Remember that saccharine does not take the place of sugar. It has a sweet taste but no food value.
 Whether canning with or without sugar, use a dependable time table and method for processing. Follow the directions and time table exactly. We want to fill all our jars and we do
