Forest Fire Control Work

Sixty Two Forest Fires Reported

District One of the North Carolina Forest Service with Headquarters at Asheville, N. C., releases the following information concerning the forest fire control activities during the period July 1, 1946 to December 31, 1946.

District one is composed of eleven counties, six of which cooperate with the State in forest fire control. These counties are: Buncombe, Henderson, McDowell, Polk, Rutherford and Yancey.

The non-cooperating counties are: Madison, Mitchell, Cleveland, Lincoln and Gaston. This report does not include these counties, as no organized work in forest fire control is carried on in them on privately owned forest land by the State organization.

During the six month period July 1, to December 31, 1946, sixty two reportable forest fires have occurred in the six cooperating counties in District one: These fires burned a total of 399.9 acres of privately owned woodland.

In the six cooperating counties there are 866,986 acres of forest area protected by the North Carolina Forest Service. Yancey county, with 74,298 acres of privately owned woodland, represents a heavy forested county in this district.

This amount of forest acreage is of considerable value to the County and State. The people of Yancey county and the State of North Carolina are urged to cooperate with the State forest fire control organization in preventing forest fires, extinguishing small fires when one is observed, reporting of fires location to nearest forest fire warden.

No. of fires: Buncombe 39, Henderson 7, McDowell 6, Polk 3, Rutherford 4, Yancey 3.

Acres burned: Buncombe 331, Henderson 56, McDowell 5.5, Polk 3, Rutherford 0.4, Yancey 4.

Causes of fires: Campers and hunters 18; Debris burning 10; Smoking 16; Incendiary 10; Lumbering 1; Railroad 3; Miscellaneous 4.

National Forest Timber for Sale

Sealed bids will be received by the Forest Supervisor, U. S. Forest Service, Box 7008, Asheville, N. C., up to and not later than 2:00 P. M. February 24, 1947 and opened immediately thereafter for all the chestnut timber designated for cutting on an area embracing about 2,060 acres lying on the watershed of Brown's Creek, tributary to South Toe River in Yancey County, N. C., Pisgah National Forest, estimated to be 2,000 cords of chestnut extractwood and 200 MBM of chestnut sawtimber, more or less. No bid of less than \$0.45 per standard cord of 128 cubic feet of stacked chestnut extractwood, \$2.00 per M ft. of chestnut sawtimber will be considered. In addition to the price bid for stumpage, a deposit of \$0.15 per cord of extractwood and \$1.00 per M ft. of sawtimber will be required for sale area betterment work. Check and shake will not be considered as defects in scaling sawlogs. \$300.00 must accompany each bid to be applied on the purchase price, refunded or returned in part as liquidated damages according to the conditions of sale. The right to reject any and all bids is reserved. Before bids are submitted full information concerning the timber, the conditions of sale and admission of bids, should be obtained from the Forest Supervisor, Asheville, N. C., or the District Ranger, Marion, N. C.
