TALKING ABOUT N. C.

Raleigh.—It is going to be a very indifferent magazine reader who escapes reading about North Carolina this month.

For three weeks in a row, the state has splashed through SATURDAY EVENING POST, said the State Advertising Division. Last week it was a color spread on square dancing, this week an Outer Banks story, and the June 5 issue will have an article about Ava Gardner entitled "Tar Heel Tornado."

The June 15th COLLIER'S had a Smoky Mountains tour story. The May COUNTRY GENTLEMAN featured mountain fashions with Asheville as the locale. There were N. C. articles in both OUTDOOR LIFE and Mississippi Valley Sportsman, as well as GARDEN GOSSIP and ESSO ROAD NEWS.

North Carolina has more than 3400 manufacturing plants which depend upon trees for their raw materials. Yet last year careless people burned nearly one million dollars worth of valuable timber in the State.

Very heavy supplies of new crop Irish potatoes have moved to market from Mississippi, Alabama, Georgia, South Carolina, and Florida, with diggings from North Carolina continuing at present.

FARMERS IN LENOIR TRY NEW FERTILIZER METHOD

Number of Lenoir county farmers tried side placement of fertilizer for their tobacco crops this year, and all have reported good results thus far, according to F. J. Koonce, Jr., county agent for the State College Extension Service.

Mr. Koonce said side placement has been recognized for a number of years as the most satisfactory method of applying fertilizer, but its advantages have not been clearly demonstrated on a farm basis until this year.

Farmers using the method have special equipment which enables them to place the fertilizer in two bands on either side of the tobacco plants. The bands of fertilizer are about seven inches apart and about one inch lower than the root of the plant after it is set. The plants are set half-way between the two bands.

This method, Mr. Koonce pointed out, reduces to a minimum fertilizer injury to the young tobacco plant roots, resulting in a better stand of tobacco and a more rapid growth during the early part of the season.

One of the first farms to use side placement for tobacco in Lenoir county was that of F. A. Gardner in the Southwood community. He found the method satisfactory in 1947. This year about 15 additional farmers had the equipment available and tried the new method.

FARM SAFETY WEEK SLATED JULY 25-31

In proclaiming the period July 25-31 as National Farm Safety Week, President Truman points out that "needless hazards on the farms of our nation continue to cause thousands of accidents each year which could be prevented by a positive safety program."

Goal for the 1948 observance, which is sponsored by the National Safety Council and the U. S. Department of Agriculture in cooperation with a number of other organizations, is the elimination of at least 30 million farm hazards. Each farm family is being asked to accept responsibility for eliminating at least one hazard for every member of the family.

The long-range purposes of National Farm Safety Week are to make every American farm and every American farm resident as safe as possible, to cut the annual toll of needless deaths and injuries to a minimum, and to make farm life safer, happier, and more prosperous.

Estimates by the National Safety Council show a 52 per cent increase in motor vehicle deaths to farm residents from 1944 to 1947. In other types of accidents, about 4,300 workers were killed and approximately 300,000 workers were injured in 1947. If the 1947 non-work toll was similar to that of 1946, the National Safety Council believes the final figures will show 14,000 non-work deaths and 1,400,000 non-work injuries to farm residents.

LADINO CLOVER CUTS POULTRY FEED COSTS

Gaston county farmer has found that the use of a half-acre Ladino clover pasture for grazing has cut feed costs for his poultry by approximately one-fourth.

Mr. Kiser seeded two pounds of Ladino on half acre in September, 1947, for the purpose of grazing his small poultry flock. He began grazing the plot with 150 hens on March 1. In May he took the hens off to allow the Ladino to get a little more growth. However, he is now using the plot for 150 pullets which are about three months old.

Notice To Veterans

Midnight of June 30 is the absolute deadline for eligible veterans to apply for free cars, or other conveyances, it was pointed out today by Jack C. Winchester, District Officer of the State Veterans Commission. Limited to WWII veterans, they must have suffered the loss, or loss of use, of a leg at or above ankle in order to qualify. Complete cost of vehicle—including all special attachments—may not exceed \$1600.00.
