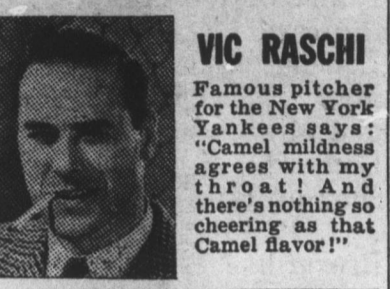

More about —
4-H CLUB NEWS
 Week was held 25 years ago with less than 400 members attending. This year boys and girls from every county in the State will be present.

L. R. Harrill, present State 4-H leader, has headed 4-H work for the full quarter of a century, and this year's program will be dedicated to him. He was responsible for combining the original corn clubs for boys and tomato clubs for girls into a single program. He also initiated the annual Club Week.

Governor Scott, one of the speakers for this year's program, is a former 4-H boy. Dr. J. H. Hilton, dean of agriculture at State College, who also will speak, was once a 4-H member in Cabarrus County.

Highlight of the week will be the Silver Anniversary party on Tuesday evening, July 24, followed by the tapping of outstanding club boys' and girls for membership in the State Honor Club.

A health pageant will be given and the king and queen of health will be crowned on Wednesday evening. The outstanding feature Thursday night will be the annual dress revue presenting the work of 4-H girls. The special week will close with the traditional candle-lighting ceremony on Friday night.

The boys and girls will be guests of Governor and Mrs. Scott at the Mansion on Wednesday. In addition to the demonstrations and livestock judging contests, finals of the 4-H speaking contest will be held during Club week for the first time.

MORE ABOUT —
 1,023,460 acres of private forest land under protection. The percentage of area burned during the spring fire season was 0.15 per cent and the average damage per acre was \$5.10 or a total damage of \$7858 to the forest land that was burned. This includes only the actual damage to standing trees.

The responsible parties were determined on 125 of the 175 fires or 72 per cent of the total number. Brush and debris burners continued to be the largest cause of forest fires. 75 or 43 per cent of the total number of fires were from this cause.

In Yancey County 13 forest fires burned during this period and 14 acres were burned. This is compared to the spring of 1949 when 13 fires occurred which burned 16 acres, and to the spring of 1942 when 21 fires occurred which burned 3956 acres of forest land.
