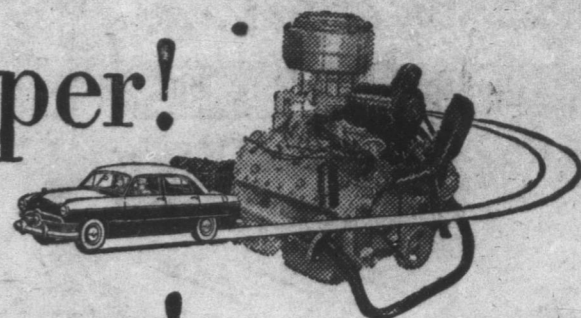
Charles L. Bailey of Plattsburg, N. Y. is visiting his father, C. R. Bailey, and other friends and relatives at Jacks Creek.
