That's hazardous Any jar with the slightest crack or chip should be dis-carded because these de-fects may prevent an air tight seal and thus lead to spoilage. SECOND TRACT: Being a part of the E. N. Harrison tract con-veyed by Deed from E. N. Harri-son to M. H. Weatherman, June 10, 1916, Deed Book 51, page 154. BEGINNING at a white oak, the J. W. McNeill corner and runs South 12 poles to a poplar in the old Dobson line; thence E. 30 poles with said line to a stake. D. H. Har-rison's corner; thence a N. course with the height of the ridge and Harrison's line 25 poles to a stake defective linings. The flat lids of two-piece metal tops cannot be reused Harrison's line 25 poles to a stake in the J. W. The pressure gage of a canner should be checked for accuracy each year, as most canning housewives know. The specialist deminds housewives that canning cannot improve any food and therefore that putting up poor quality food does not pay.
