We are sorry to learn that Mrs. Frank Huskins is in a Richmond, Va. hospital again.

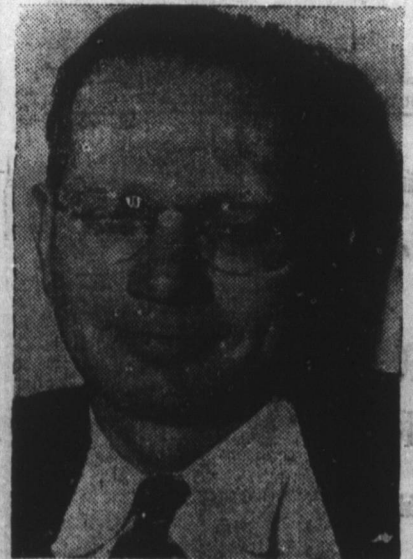
