Many Families Buy Farms Through FHA Loans

According to Mack B. Ray, official of the Farmers Home Administration here, eighty Farm Ownership Loans have been made in Yancey County to date. There has never been a delinquent account in the county, and there have been no losses to the Federal Government in this county, he said. To date there have been no foreclosures because of default of payments on homes or farms. Last year all farmers in the county who had loans from FHA were ahead of schedule on their payments an average of \$620.00 each.

NORTH CAROLINIAN WINS 4-H AWARD



Sherley J. Blackburn, 20-year-old Mountain Park, N. C., boy, wins national 4-H Club forestry honors.

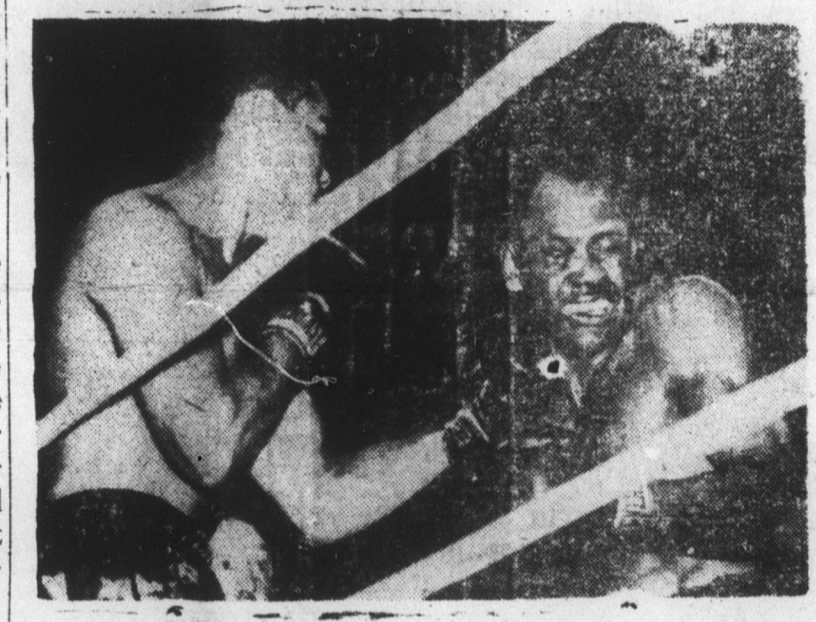
For outstanding achievements in farm forestry, Sherley J. Blackburn won a \$300 scholarship plus an all-expense paid trip to Chicago. The scholarship was presented November 30 at the twenty-ninth National 4-H Club Congress in Chicago.

The North Carolina youth earned his award by putting sound forestry practices to work on his father's farm. In addition to planting 5,000 shortleaf pine trees on a steep and eroded hillside, young Blackburn spotted 500 white pines in the farm woodlot after improvement cutting.

He also thinned two separate one-acre plots on the farm woodlot and planted a half-acre wildlife border of sericea and bi-color lespedeza. In all his farm forestry work, the Mountain Park 4-H winner strives for stand improvement by cutting scrubby trees for firewood and leaving straight, sound trees for more valuable timber crops.

In the last seven years young Blackburn has made a profit of \$9,525 from his 33 4-H Club projects including forestry, dairy, baby beef, tobacco, wild-

Board Chairman Advises Draftees

Selective Service registrants of this county should observe a few simple rules in presenting their cases to the Draft Board. Mr. R. N. Silver, Chairman of the Yancey County Board, stated that registrants and interested persons could help the Draft Board and themselves if they will observe the three following suggestions: (1) Present in writing a statement of all facts which they believe will entitle the registrant to deferment. This should be presented at the time the questionnaire is returned. Any subsequent change in status that might warrant reclassification should be reported in writing. (2) File within ten days after the Notice of Classification is mailed, a request for personal appearance before the Board, if desired. Such a request will be granted if filed within ten days, but only one appearance will be

granted after each classification. (3) Should appeal be desired, give to the local board notice of appeal in writing within ten days after the date of mailing of the Notice of Classification. This applies to the notice mailed after either the original classification or the notice issued after personal appearance before the Board.

Mr. Silver pointed out that observance of these simple rules would give everyone assurance that the local board was fully informed of the facts which might have a bearing upon the registrant's classification. He added that persons who wish to discuss a case with the Board should request an appearance at the proper time and not attempt to discuss it with individual Board Members outside of the Local Board office. He pointed out that such practice would save time and that the interested parties could then be sure that all of the Board
