## Family Farm Review Meeting Dates Announced

The schedule of meetings to be held in Yancey county in the U. S. Department of Agriculture's family farm policy review has been announced by W. M. Hensley, chairman of the County Agricultural Mobilization Committee.

The review meetings, which all farmers, farm organization representatives, and others interested in Yancey county agriculture are invited to attend, will be held at the following times and places:

Micaville School—Monday September 3, 8:00 p. m.; Court House—Tuesday, September 4, 8:00 p. m.; Bee Log School—Friday, September 7, 10 a. m.

Bald Creek School—Tuesday September 11, 8 p. m.; Clearmont School—Thursday, September 13, 8 p. m.; County meeting—Monday, September 17, at 10 a. m. in the Yancey Theatre.

Suggestions on farm programs and services which should be eliminated, changed or strengthened and enlarged are sought from all individual farmers and from all rural organizations, Mr. Hensley said. The review will deal with all agencies of the Department. Mr. Hensley said. These include those which provide soil conservation assistance, information and education, farm credit, crop insurance, acre age allotments and quotas, price supports, farm forestry aid, and rural electrification.

"Any changes that are made will affect you and your farm," Mr. Hensley said. "This is your opportunity to tell the Secretary of Agriculture what changes you think are needed."

"Whether you wish to praise or to criticize, to curtail, modify, or expand any one of the present services to farmers or to recommend new programs, make your views known to the County Agricultural Mobilization Committee."
