RECIPE OF THE WEEK Molded Ginger Ale Salad (Serves 4-6)

34 cup ginger ale 1 package lemon-flavored gelatin

1/2 cup cubed, canned pineapple

1/4 cup broken walnut meats ½ cup dates, cut in pieces

Heat 1 cup ginger ale and pour over gelatin. Stir until completely dissolved. Add remaining ginger ale (cold) and cool mixture until of the consistency of molasses. Bleach should be added to the white cottons when washing so they do not turn gray. Always use the amount directed on the package or bottle, as too much may prove too strong and thus cause the clothes to fall apart.

Quick starches are valuable, too, in making the clothes crisp. Use a bottled type which is always ready or an instant type which just needs

tirring into the water. Rinsing is as important as washing, whether it's done as part of the big laundry or in a wash basin. Two or three rinses are essential, and the water should be the same temperature as that used for actual washing.

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

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
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
