Unemployment Insurance Frauds Detected In N. C.

Chairman Henry E. Kendall of the Employment Security Commission of North Carolina states that progress has been made during the past two years in the prevention and detection of fraud by those who abuse the unemployment insurance program. Seventeen Claims Deand determine eligibility or questionable claims for unemployment benefits. John G. Roach, Claims Deputy for the 16th district, states that during the twelve months ending June 30, 1953, he made 75 complete investigations in this district, which comprises nine western and Piedmont, North Carolina

In 58 cases, claimants were found to have received pay_ ments which they were not legally entitled to receive. Fourtried in a court of a Justice of the peace, or in a Recorder's Court. Ten of these were found guilty of fraud, paying fines and costs. They were also disqualified to receive benefits for the balance of the year, and demand was made for refund of all overpayments. Four were acquitted or their cases were dismissed. In the remaining 44 cases, claimants were not indicted for fraud, for lack of evi_ dence or for insufficient evidennone, McDowell three, Avery none, and Mitchell two.
