NOTICE

THE FOLLOWING IS PART OF AN ORDINANCE PASSED BY TOWN OFFICIALS:

WHEREAS, there is a large amount of Water Bonds outstanding which were issued by the Town of Burnsville, North Carolina, and which will mature in 1965 and the payment of which the Board of Commissioners of the Town of Burnsville hopes to meet without increasing the Town tax rate;

AND WHEREAS, the Board of Commissioners of the Town of Burnsville find it necessary to make extensive repairs on the first reservoir, known as reservoir No. 1, constructed by the Town of Burnsville, for the purpose of taking care of any emergencies which might arise and likewise to meet the increased use of water from the Town water system;

AND WHEREAS, the Board of Commissioners of the Town of Burnsville are of the opinion that the water rate should be increased.

NOW, THEREFORE, upon motion made, seconded and unanimously carried, it is ORDERED:

1. That beginning with the month of July, 1955, the flat rate for each water connection or account shall be \$2.25 per month;
2. That a discount of 25c for each water connection or account per month shall be allowed on the account paid if the account is paid on or before the 10th day of the month following the month for which the water bill is due.
