Former Burnsville Mayor Passes Away

M. A. Bailey, formerly of Burnsville and Yancey County, passed away November 5 at his home in Andersonville, Virginia, where he had resided with his son, Roy H. Bailey, for the past five years. Funeral services were held at the First Baptist Church in Burnsville on Tuesday. The Rev. C. B. Trammel was in charge and was assisted by the Rev. A. Z. Jameson. Burial was in the Bailey Cemetery.

Mr. Bailey was a member of a pioneer family of this section, and was married to the late Mary Jane Huskins of Green Mtn., who passed away in 1936, was a relative of Yellow Jacket John Bailey, who gave the site for the County Seat of Yancey on which is now located the County Court House and the Bailey Square.

Mr. Bailey was very active in church work in the Baptist Church of Burnsville during the many years he lived here. He also had active political and business interests. He was Mayor of the Town of Burnsville and served for two terms in this capacity. It was under his administration that the first improvements were made in the town of Burnsville. The improvements included the paving of the streets and installing the modern water system which now supplies the city with water. Mr. Bailey was on the arrangement committee when the statue of Otway Burns was unveiled on the square in 1910. (Otway Burns for whom the Town of Burnsville was named). He also helped in the establishing of the Yancey Collegiate Institute, which served this area for more than a quarter of a century.

Avery County News Purchased By Yancey Publishers

Announcement was made today of the sale of the Avery News to John McConnell and Erling Toness of Burnsville, who will publish the paper for Avery County. They are at present publishing a new weekly paper, The Toe Valley View, in Bakersville, for Mitchell County, and Toness is publishing The Yancey Record under a lease arrangement with the owner, Arney Fox.

The Avery News, previously published by Howard Zumbro and Sherman Pritchard, both of Elizabethton, Tennessee, had recently announced plans to expand into a tri-county paper for Mitchell, Avery and Yancey. Ill health has necessitated Zumbro's leaving the publishing business temporarily, and the change in plans.

This week The Toe Valley View and the Avery News appear in a combined issue, published today, but the publishers state that the two papers will appear separately again soon, when the mechanical problems of separate publication have been worked out.

It is stated in this week's combined issue of the two papers that the name contest announced by the Avery News on October 20 will be carried out, except that the name chosen as winner will not necessarily be used, since no change is now contemplated in the name of the Avery News. The prizes will be awarded as announced, however.

In an editorial in the combined issue, the new publishers state that they believe the existence of three separate but cooperating newspapers for each of the three counties will preserve the independence and local flavor of the Avery News, The Toe Valley View, and The Yancey Record, while giving each the greater efficiency of some combined facilities.


