Health Dept. News

Pre-school clinics are being announced by the Yancey County Health Department. All parents are urged to bring their children, who are entering school this fall, to the clinic held at the school they will attend so that they may be examined to discover physical defects. It is required by law that children be immunized against whooping cough, diphtheria, tetanus and smallpox before entering school. Children may be taken to their private physicians or to the Health Department in Burnsville for these immunizations.

The local doctors have volunteered to give physical examinations to pre-school children in the absence of a health director, and clinics are scheduled as fol-
