World's Best-Selling Novel Had Hectic Time Since Publication Date
A little more than twenty-five years ago (February 6, 1926) a book was published which became the most celebrated and controversial novel in print today. Since that publication date when Erskine Caldwell's "God's Little Acre," first appeared, better than nine million copies have rolled off the press. This book sold more copies than any other work of fiction in history of literature. At various times during its turbulent publishing career, readers, publishers, editors, book experts, were sure about one thing—"God's Little Acre" could never be filmed. Caldwell's lusty Walden clan was too earthy for the sensitivities of some readers. And for twenty-five years they were right. Too Realistic
The book was simply too realistic. Its people were thoroughly human, and heir to all the bedevils of the human flesh. Caldwell, in a sense, rebelled against the Nice Nellyisms of the early 1900's which was still influencing the literary world to late as 1933. His frankness shocked those who were enamored of "The Seven Little Peppers" and "Rebecca of Sunnybrook Farm." It remained for Caldwell to join forces with Producer-Director Anthony Mann and Producer Sidney Harmon to undertake filming "God's Little Acre" at long last. The picture which stars Robert Ryan, Aldo Ray, Tina Louise, Buddy Hackett and Fay Spain, has now reached our town where it will open Sunday, July 6th at the Yanney Theatre and be shown for six nights.
